The Great Mortality - John Kelly

Focus: The Black Death (1347–1351)

Big Questions:

- What were the biological and environmental causes of the plague?
- How did the pandemic reshape social, political, and religious life in Europe?

- Social Disruption

What to Look For:

- Geographic spread via trade routes
- Role of superstition and scapegoating
- Eyewitness accounts and how they shape the narrative
- Changes in labor systems and social structure

- Demographic collapse and feudalism
- Church authority and heretical movements
- Early seeds of the Renaissance

The Hundred Years War - David Green

Focus: The prolonged conflict between England and France (1337–1453) **Big Questions:**

- What were the causes and consequences of the Hundred Years' War?
- How did war influence nationalism and political identity?

Key Themes:

- Dynastic politics
- Military evolution
- Nationalism
- Power and legitimacy

What to Look For:

- Roles of Edward III, Henry V, Joan of Arc
- How the war impacted peasantry and nobility
- Use of propaganda and chronicles
- The war's influence on state formation

- Growth of national monarchies
- Decline of chivalry
- Long-term military and technological change

The Little Ice Age - Brian Fagan

Focus: Climate changes in Europe (1300–1850)

Big Questions:

- How did climate shape European economies, migrations, and conflicts?
- How did societies adapt to environmental stress?

Key Themes:

- Environmental history
- Agricultural change
- Resilience and collapse
- Economic hardship

What to Look For:

- Specific cold periods and their effects
- Famines, rebellions, and cultural changes
- Climate's role in historical turning points

- Pre-industrial economy and population stress
- Relationship between environment and revolution
- Science, skepticism, and early modern thought

1381: The Year of the Peasants – Juliet Barker

Focus: The English Peasants' Revolt

Big Questions:

- What caused the revolt, and what were its effects?
- How did commoners challenge authority and express political thought?

- Early political consciousness

What to Look For:

- Roles of Wat Tyler and John Ball
- Local grievances vs national policies
- Government response and aftermath

- Decline of feudalism
- Rise of centralized monarchies
- Voice of the lower classes in European history

A Distant Mirror – Barbara Tuchman

Focus: 14th-century Europe through the life of Enguerrand de Coucy **Big Questions:**

- How can one person's life reflect the age they lived in?
- What do the crises of the 14th century reveal about medieval society?

Key Themes:

- War, plague, and social transformation
- Religion and authority
- Personal biography as a historical lens

What to Look For:

- Tuchman's blend of narrative and analysis
- Recurring themes: war, faith, wealth, death
- Role of the nobility and changing feudal norms

- End of the medieval world
- Social upheaval and the coming of modern Europe
- Critical view of institutions (Church, monarchy)
